To Charles Cooper, on account of Stealing, of which he was convicted in New County Court, at September Term 1827, and for which he was sentenced to seven years confinement in the Penitentiary.

To Samuel Hopkins, on account of Stealing, of which he was convicted in Baltimore City Court, at February Term 1830, and for which he was sentenced to five years confinement in the Penitentiary.
