

January 9th 1832

Ordered that the Treasurer of the Western Shore pay Henry Jones or Owen Leventy, two dollars & about five cents for one quarter postage up to the first instant, viz. for the Execution \$55.82, for three Assistant Judges \$2.07 and for the Treasurer \$14.86 & remain paid.

January 14 1832

Ordered that the Armorer at Frederick deliver to Captain Gerrard & Warfield or order sixty muskets and sixty Cartouch Boxes.

Monday January 16th 1832

His Excellency George Howard Governor Elect, this day attended in the Council Chamber, and at the request of both branches of the Legislature, communicated by a Joint Committee, repaired to the Senate Chamber, at twelve o'clock and, in the presence of both Houses, qualified by taking the Oath prescribed by the Constitution and Laws of the State, and by subscribing a declaration of his belief in the Christian Religion.

The Honorable Thomas Worthington, Samuel Turner and Robert W. Bowie, Councilors elect, also, this day attended in the Council Chamber, and qualified by taking the Oath aforesaid, before Charles Thompson Esquire a Justice of the Peace for Anne Arundel County, and by subscribing their belief in the Christian Religion.

Tuesday January 17 1832

The Council met P. M. E. S. V.

The Council appointed Thomas Culbreth, then Clerk, who, thereupon qualified, as such, by taking the Oath prescribed by the Constitution of this State and of the United States, before Charles Thompson Esquire a Justice of the Peace for Anne Arundel County, and by subscribing a declaration of his belief in the Christian Religion.

On the nomination of His Excellency the Governor, and with the advice and consent of the Council, Henry C. Thompson appointed Messinger of the Council, who, thereupon, qualified as such, by taking the Oath prescribed by the Constitution of this State, and of the United States, before Charles Thompson Esquire, a Justice of the Peace for Anne Arundel County, and by subscribing a declaration of his belief in the Christian Religion.
