By the petition of Gerard Hopkins of Joseph, accompanied by a transcript from the Records of Arundel County Court, it appears that he entered into a recognizance for appearance before the said Court, at April Term 1831 to answer for an assault and battery on Theodore N. Williams, and that the said Recognizance has been forfeited. The petition represents that the breach of the peace with which he was charged has long since been settled and the whole matter between the parties until relieved by an execution against him, and he is now in Jail without the possibility to discharge the same.
