

Mr. Bowie submitted the following resolutions which were adopted.

Resolved that Jeremiah L. Boyd be employed to cause the State House to be covered with tin, on the present covering in a substantial and workmanlike manner, and to do such repairs to the roof of the State House as may be necessary to preserve the building and keep it from leaking, and that he be allowed two hundred dollars, as a compensation therefor.

Resolved, that the Clerk of the Journal be authorized to draw upon the Treasurer of the Western Shore for and time to time, for such sum or sums of money as may be necessary, (not exceeding two thousand dollars,) to enable Jeremiah L. Boyd to execute a contract made by him with this Department to recover the State House with tin, upon the present covering and to do such other repairs to the same of the said State House as may be necessary to preserve the building and keep it from leaking.

His Excellency the Governor, this day granted the following Pardon, viz:

To Stephen Parker, a Pardon on account of felony, inasmuch as he was convicted in Baltimore City Court, and for which he was sentenced to the Penitentiary for five years, at June Term 1829.

To Thomas Buchanan a Pardon on account of stealing, of which he was convicted in Anne Arundel County Court at April Term 1827, and for which he was sentenced to the Penitentiary for seven years.

To John Downin, a Pardon on account of stealing, of which he was convicted in Washington County Court, at November Term 1831, and for which he was sentenced to the Penitentiary for two years.

To Thomas Roberts, a Pardon on account of bleeding to death negro Greenburg William, of which he was convicted in Baltimore City Court, at June Term 1833, and for which he was sentenced to the Penitentiary for two years.

To Lyppolite Bridol, a Pardon on account of larceny, of which he was convicted in Baltimore City Court, at June Term 1833, and for which he was sentenced to the Penitentiary for four years.

To John H. Slater, a Pardon on account of attempting to pass a forged Note of Thomas C. Johnson, of which he was convicted in Baltimore City Court, at June Term 1833, but was sentenced to the Penitentiary for four years.
