

Wednesday October 16th 1833.

Returns of the Election held on the Seventh Instant for Sheriffs of
Hartford, Cecil and Somerset Counties having been received, and it appearing
by the returns from Hartford County that Preston McCormac was declared duly
elected and first named in said return, and that he had the greatest number
of legal votes, as Sheriff of the said County; and it appearing by the returns from
Cecil County, that Noble Cunningham was declared duly elected, and first named
in said return, and that he had the greatest number of legal votes, as Sher-
iff of said County; and it appearing by the returns from Somerset County that
Samuel G. Holbrook was declared duly elected, and first named in said
return, and that he had the greatest number of legal votes, as Sheriff of the
said County, in commissions were this day issued to the said Preston McCormac
as Sheriff of Hartford County; to the said Noble Cunningham, as Sheriff of
Cecil County; and to the said Samuel G. Holbrook, as Sheriff of Somerset
County.

Ordered that the Treasurer of the Western Shore pay Thomas
Cylbreth or order three hundred and seventy five dollars for one quarter
Salary as Clerk of the Council due the first Instant.

His Excellency the Governor this day granted a Pardon to
Richard Walmsley, on account of an assault & Battery on Edward Short,
of which he was convicted in Kent County Court at September Term 1833,
and for which he was sentenced to three months imprisonment
(See Pardon Record).

Thursday October 17th 1833.

Returns of the Election held on the Seventh Instant for Sheriffs
of Caroline County, having been received, by which it appears that William
Darell was declared duly elected, and first named therein, and that he
had the greatest number of legal votes, as Sheriff of the said County, -
commission was this day issued to him as Sheriff as aforesaid.

His Excellency the Governor this day granted the
following Pardons viz

To James Haley, a Person on account of Robbery,
which he was convicted in Baltimore City Court at February Term
and for which he was sentenced to the Penitentiary for five years.

To John W. Sennott, a Person on account of a theft
of which he was convicted in Montgomery County Court at March Term
1830, and for which he was sentenced to the Penitentiary for 2 years.
