

Monday October 21st 1833.

The Council having been notified to meet this day
His Excellency James Thomas Governor, and the Honble
Thomas & Worthington & John C. Martin attended.

Returns having been received of the Election held on the
Seventh Instant for Sheriff of Baltimore, Worcester & Kent Counties;
and it appearing by the returns from Baltimore County, that Henry
S. Sanderson, had the greatest number of legal votes, and that he
was duly elected, and first named in said returns, as Sheriff of the
said County; and it appearing by the returns from Worcester County,
that Joseph Cutchison, had the greatest number of legal votes, and
that he was duly elected and first named in said returns, as Sheriff
of the said County; and it appearing by the returns from Kent County,
that Philip B. Brasilla, had the greatest number of legal votes, and
that he was duly elected, and first named, in said returns, as Sheriff
of the said County. — Committings were this day issued to the said
Henry S. Sanderson, as Sheriff of Baltimore County; to the said
Joseph Cutchison, as Sheriff of Worcester County; and to the said
Philip B. Brasilla, as Sheriff of Kent County. —

His Excellency the Governor this day granted the following
Pardon viz.

To Joseph Christie, a Pardon on account of Stealing,
for which he was convicted in Baltimore City Court, at October Term
1833, but for which he was not sentenced.

To Alfred Carving, a Pardon on account of Stealing,
of which he was convicted in Baltimore City Court, at February
Term 1830, and for which he was sentenced to the Penitentiary for
