His Excellency the Governor this day granted the following
Pardons viz

To Francis Stroggin on account of a Murder in the second
degree, of which he was convicted in Charles County Court, at March
Term one thousand eight hundred and thirty one, and for which he was
sentenced to the Penitentiary for seven years.

To John H. Slater, on account of Forgery of which he was
convicted in Baltimore County Court, at November Term one thousand
eight hundred and thirty three.

To George Roberts, on account of Stealing two bushels of Corn in the
City of which he was convicted in Baltimore County Court, at November
Term one thousand eight hundred and thirty three.

To John Hays alias Hales on account of passing a counterfeit
\$10 note to Thomas C. Conroy, of which he was convicted in ~~Howard~~
County Court at November Term one thousand eight hundred and
thirty three, and for which he was sentenced to the Penitentiary for
five years.

To Thomas Marr, on account of Stealing one silver
plated Bread Basket, of which he was convicted in Anne Arundel
County Court at October Term one thousand eight hundred and
thirty nine, and for which he was sentenced to the Penitentiary for

The State of Maryland, to the Sheriff of Baltimore County,
Greeting. Whereas Nelson Wallace, negro, late of Baltimore County,
was convicted in Baltimore City Court, at October Term in the year of our
Lord one thousand eight hundred and thirty three of having committed a
Rape upon the body of Margaret H. Grace, and by the said Court sentenced
to be hung by the neck until he be dead. Now, therefore, there we
do will and require, as also to charge and command you that, on
or before twelve of the Clock on Friday the twentieth day of December
next, you take the said Nelson Wallace, negro, from prison, and him
