

His Excellency the Governor this day granted a Pardon to
Henry Lusby on account of Man-Slaughter, for which he was convicted in
Anne Arundel County Court at April Term 1831, and for which he was sentenced
to the Penitentiary for five years. (See Pardon Record).

On the termination of His Excellency the Governor, and by and
with the advice and consent of the Council Charles A. Stewart was appointed
one of the Commissioners of Anne Arundel County, Nic Hall died, and
Commission issued accordingly.

By the petition of Archelus B. Price, and transcripts from the
Records of Talbot County Court it appears that the said Archelus B. Price
entered into three several recognizances in the sum of fifty dollars in each case
for his appearance before Talbot County Court from day to day at November
Term 1831 to answer for three several assaults and batteries on the body
of Bennett Jones, and that the said Recognizances were afterwards
forfeited. The petitioner states that said Recognizances having been
respected to the next term, and not understanding that his said Recognizances
bound him to attend in Court from day to day, after they had been so respected,
and being out of Court at the time his cases were called the said Recognizances
were forfeited, and that writs of Habeas Corpus ad Satisfaciendum have been issued for
said forfeiture, upon which he is confined in the Jail of the said County, and
that he is unable to pay the amount thereof. He further states that he
has submitted to the Court Law and been fined two dollars in each
case for said assaults and batteries, and as the ends of Justice have thereby
been satisfied he prays for a remission of the said forfeitures. And the
Court having recommended a compliance with his prayer we do hereby
remit the same.

By the petition of Silas Shuman and a transcript from
the Records of Anne Arundel County Court, it appears that he was fined
by the said Court at April Term 1832 three thousand pounds of Tobacco
for selling liquor on a Sunday. The petitioner admits that he
did sell a small quantity of liquor to James Cole on Sunday,
from which he thought the peculiar circumstances of the case justified
him in doing, the said James Cole being a waterman and necessity
at the time appearing to require it. He further represents that he has a
large family to support and is poor and unable to pay said fine, and
therefore prays for relief. And sundry respectable Citizens of the
said County having recommended the said Silas Shuman to Executive
Clemency, and two of the Judges of the said Court having joined in said
recommendation. We do hereby remit the said fine.
