

in the Resolution of the Legislature, of this date, and that they be stated in such way as, in his Judgment, will be best calculated to effect the object contemplated by the said Resolution, and that he hold himself subject to the orders of the Department, and make such reports from time to time as circumstances may seem to require.

By a recommendation of the Judges of Cecil County Court, it appears that at October Term of the said Court in the year 1834, they imposed a fine of ten dollars on Samuel H. White, for selling goods without license. They state, that at the trial of the said Samuel H. White it appeared that he had up to the month of December 1833, been a merchant in the City of Baltimore, where he had regularly taken out license for the year commencing on the first of July 1833, that they were satisfied that the neglect of said Samuel H. White to take out license in Cecil County, after his removal arose from a mistake with the papers conferred upon him by his license in Baltimore City, and not from any intention to evade or violate the Law, and that therefore they imposed on him the lowest amount of fine allowed by Law, and recommended a remission of said fine. We do hereby remit the said fine.
