

By the petition of Zachariah Thompson, and a transcript from the Records of Montgomery County Court, it appears that the said Zachariah Thompson had entered into a recognizance in the sum of fifty dollars for his appearance before the said County Court at November term 1834 to answer for and against Watling & Co, and that the said recognizance was afterwards forfeited.

The petitioner states that he appeared at the term after the recognizance was entered into, and the State not being ready for trial his recognizance was respited until the next term, when he failed to attend and forfeiture was entered up against him. He further states that he did appear at the succeeding term and was fined fifty cents. Under these circumstances he prays for relief from said forfeiture. And the said Court having recommended a remission of said forfeiture, we do hereby remit the same.
