His Excellency the Governor granted a Nolle Prosequi to negro Peter or Edward, Slave of Edward D. Young, on account of a charge of attempting to commit a Rape, on the person of Judith, Slave of Mrs. Manning, on which he had been committed to the Jail of Prince Georges County, by the Justices of the Peace.

By the petition of Thomas Quantrell and a transcript from the Records of Washington County Court, it appears that the said Thomas Quantrell and William O. Sprigg had entered into a Recognizance in the sum of one hundred dollars for the appearance of said Q. & Quantrell before Washington County Court, at November Term 1833. & that the said Recognizance was afterwards forfeited.

The petitioners represent that he has been, by various misfortunes, reduced from affluence to great poverty, and that he has a large family dependant upon him, and that he is altogether unable to pay said forfeiture, that the said William O. Sprigg was induced by friendship for said petitioner to become bound in said Recognizance, and will have it to pay unless relieved therefrom by Executive interposition.

And one of the Judges of the said Court, several Gentlemen of the Bar, and other respectable citizens have joined the petitioners in a remission of said forfeiture, and do hereby remit the same.
