

The State of Maryland, to wit: Whereas, in compliance with the demand of His Excellency Joseph Ritner Governor of the State of Pennsylvania, orders have been given for the surrender of a certain person calling himself James Jones, as a fugitive from the Justice of the said State to James Duncan Esquire, agent duly appointed to receive the said fugitive and transport him to the said State of Pennsylvania: it appearing from authentic documents transmitted to the Executive Department of this State that the said James Jones stands charged on oath with having in his possession a quantity of Watches, Jewells &c believed to be the property of Jacob Nanneider, whose store in Callowhill Street in the County of Philadelphia, was, on or about the ninth of April last robbed of the same. Now therefore, I Thomas W. Neasey Governor of the State of Maryland, do hereby require and enjoin all persons within this State, to let the said James Duncan Esquire, agent as aforesaid, pass with the said fugitive unmolested to the said State of Pennsylvania; but the said agent conducting himself in a peaceable and orderly manner, and using no improper severity or cruelty in his treatment of the said prisoner.
