

or full and particular account of the cost of the materials and labour which may be found necessary about the said building - Provided that the vacant adjoining lot proposed to be purchased shall first be obtained at a price not exceeding the estimate of the aforesaid Committee.

Ordered that the Clerk of the Council draw out the Treasury when funds shall be received from the Loan authorized for building a Warehouse and when the Bond of Samuel & William Murphy for faithful performance as Superintendent, shall be executed, approved and filed, in favour of the said Samuel & William Murphy for any sum not exceeding ten thousand dollars.

Ordered that the Treasurer of the Western Shore pay Thomas Emory, James Sewall, Ebenezer Macey, Thomas J. Carter, Edward N. Hambleton, Thomas H. Hicks, John Dennis, and Ebenezer Spear, Commissioners for making a reconnaissance and survey of the Eastern Shore Rail Road, or to them or two of them five thousand dollars for defraying the expenses of said survey, as authorized by Resolution of the General Assembly, to be accounted for.
