This meeting the former granted the following Pardon

To James H. King on account of Murder the 1st degree, of which
he was convicted in Court of Sessions, County of New York for which he was
sentenced on the 5th Dec 1831 to the Penitentiary for 12 years.

To Jacob Whipple on account of fornicating a Bar, of which
he was convicted in Frederick County Court, and for which he was sentenced
in November 1829 to the Penitentiary for 12 years.

To Amos H. Slater on account of purchasing a case of forged
instruments knowing them to have been stolen, of which he was convicted
and for which he was sentenced to the Penitentiary for three years.

To Amos J. Smith on account of Burglary of which he was
convicted in 1831 and for which he was sentenced to the Penitentiary for
seven years.

To Bishop Canterbury on account of Rape of which
he was convicted, and for which he was sentenced to the Penitentiary on the
20th of November 1828 for term of one year.

The foregoing Pardon granted the 1st Instant

To Alexander Cunningham, do. John Harper, on account
of selling ill-gotten goods, & being first found guilty of the same
in Court of Sessions of which he was convicted in Baltimore City Court at October
Term 1836 was granted the 11th Instant (see Pardon Record)

To David C. Volkening, do. John Brown on account of a
charge for being a gambler in Washington County Court of Sessions
for which he was convicted, but being with intent to kill. (See Pardon Record)
granted the 11th Instant.
