Edelin in the sum of fifty dollars each for the appearance of the said Joseph Butler before the said Georgia County Court at April Term 1835 to answer & and that the said Recognizance has been forfeited. The petitioners state the said Butler regularly appeared at the succeeding Term and attended the said Court, and after said April Term 1836 the said Recognizance was forfeited through some mistake or inadvertence as the said Butler did regularly and constantly attend the Court, and always until discharged was to be found in and about the Court House, ready and anxious to have a trial upon the accusation against him, and at the said Court the trial was had, and he discharged by reason of the State having failed to sustain her prosecution. They represent that the said Butler was at the said Court as they believe when the said Recognizance was called, but being illiterate and ignorant of business he may not have heard the case called, or, be it that he did not understand the nature & character of the proceeding, that he has never evaded or attempted to defeat the process of the State, but was always in attendance until discharged by the Surgeons of the Court. He therefore prays for a remission of the said forfeiture. And the said representation being verified by the affidavits of the said Butler to its truth, and the Judges of the said Court and many respectable Citizens of the said County having recommended compliance with the prayer of the said petitioners - we do hereby remit the said forfeiture.

To Tom Brown, free negro on account of stealing, of which he was convicted in Frederick County Court, at May Term 1837, and for which he was sentenced to the Penitentiary for four years.
