Yours of the 9th Instant, in relation to William Freeman,
who, it had been represented to you, was confined in Jail in Baltimore,
as a runaway slave, being received by me in the absence of Governor
Thomas from the Seat of Government, I transmitted your representation
to the Honorable Nicholas Baice, Chief Judge of Baltimore City Court,
as the speediest means of effecting the liberation of the prisoner if
he should be found entitled to a discharge. I have now the honor
to forward you Judge Baice's reply to my communication, and also
a copy of the Commitment of Freeman. From these you will
perceive that the representation made to you was incorrect, and
that the prisoner is confined upon a charge of Felony committed in
the State of New York.
