To His Excellency The Governor of the State of Virginia.

It appears by the aforesaid papers duly authenticated according to the Laws of this State that William Harman on or about the 10th day of July last broke into the store of Gellings and Selmon and stole therefrom about forty dollars in Bank notes and specie and about ten dollars worth of Merchandise and it has been represented to me that he has fled from the justice of this State and has taken refuge within the State of Virginia. Now therefore Pursuant to the provisions of the Constitution and Laws of the United States in such case made and provided, I do hereby request that the said William Harman be apprehended and delivered to William O. Chappell who is duly authorized to receive and convey him to the State of Maryland where to be dealt with according to Law.

Jonathan Jackson and George Rizzo who had been convicted in Baltimore County by the Circuit Court of an assault and battery and fined thirty dollars each prayed to have the same remitted.

The petition which was accompanied by a transcript from the records stated that on the proceedings for which they were fined they had no intention whatever to break the Law. Their case was recommended by the Judges of the Court and the said fines were usually remitted on condition of the payment of costs.

October 15th

William W. Stewart who had been convicted in Baltimore City Court of an Assault and Battery & sentenced to be imprisoned for three months and pay a fine of one hundred dollars of a fine filed his petition stating these facts and that he had already served out the term of his imprisonment and prays to be released from the said fine
