### Proclamation

William G. Mason Governor of Maryland To all whom these presents may concern

Wherein I have received from the judges of Election in the several Counties of this State, returns of an election held on Wednesday the second instant for members to represent this State in the Congress of the United States and have carefully ascertained the number of votes given for every person voted for as such Now therefore in pursuance of the Law in such case made and provides, I do by this my proclamation declare that John S. H. Worthington of the first district, Philip Francis Thomas of the second district John T. H. Worthington of the third district, James Carroll and Solomon Hillen Jr of the fourth district, William Cook Johnson of the fifth district, Francis Thomas of the sixth district and Samuel Jonifer of the seventh district, appear by the said returns to have had the highest number of votes in their respective districts and were duly elected members to represent this State in the next Congress of the United States

The Governor demanded from the Governor of Virginia as fugitives from Justice, Michael Smullen and William M. Larkin charged with having maliciously beaten a certain John Morris a citizen of Allegheny County, so that he shortly died of the wound so received in the following words

State of Maryland to wit

William G. Mason Governor of the State of Maryland to His Excellency the Governor of the State of Virginia

It appears by the annexed papers, duly authenticated according to the laws of this State, that Michael Smullen and William M. Larkin stand charged by the affidavit of sundry persons with having maliciously beaten a certain John Morris a citizen of Allegheny County in this State so that he shortly died of the wound so received and it has been represented to me that they have fled from the Justice of this State and have taken refuge within the State of Virginia Now therefore pursuant to the provisions of the Constitution and Laws of the United States in such case made
