Certificate of
The Election of
Members of
Congress.

The following certificate of the Election of Members of Congress to represent this State at the election held on Wednesday the 2nd day of October last was transmitted to each of the gentlemen elected to the Secretary of State of the United States and to the Clerk of the House of Representatives.

State of Maryland to wit:

Whereas an election was held on Wednesday the second day of October last on the several Congressional Districts of this State, as described by Law for members to represent the State in the next Congress of the United States, and whereas it is made the duty of the Governor, after having ascertained the number of votes given for each person voted for and declared by proclamation the names of those duly elected, to transmit a certificate of said Election to the Secretary of State of the United States, or other proper officer authorized to receive the same, to be by him delivered to the House of Representatives in the Congress of the United States when assembled: And whereas the number of said votes has been ascertained and proclamation made accordingly

Now therefore I William Gorman Governor of the State of Maryland do hereby certify, that by the returns of the said elections on the several Counties of this State, made agreeably to Law, it appears that John Dennis of the first District, Philip Francis Thomas of the second District John P. Worthington of the third District, James Carroll and Solomon Bellin Jr of the fourth District, William Cost Johnson of the fifth District, Francis Thomas of the sixth District and Daniel Jones of the seventh District, had the highest number of votes in their respective Districts and were duly elected members to represent this State in the next Congress of the United States

Given under my hand and the Great Seal of the State of Maryland on this fourth day of November in the year of our
