The Governor sent the following message to the House of Delegates.

March 6th 1841.

To the House of Delegates.

I have carefully considered your Resolutions
requesting me to convene the Legislature at the earliest convenient
day, for the transaction of important business, which cannot
be completed within the period to which your Session is now
limited.

The Senate and House of Delegates are the proper judges
of the legislative business of the State, and of the time requiring
for transacting it: and I consider it the duty of the Executive in
cases like the present, to exercise the power of calling them together,
when he is requested to do so by both houses.
