

Oct 10th 1842

This day made a requisition upon the Governor of Pennsylvania for the apprehension and delivery of a certain James Connor; said requisition being in these words: viz;

"State of Maryland, - To Wit:

I Francis Thomas Governor of the State of Maryland,

To His Excellency the Governor of Pennsylvania.

It appears by the annexed Papers, duly authenticated according to the laws of this State, that a certain James Connor stands charged on the oath of Pleasant Hunter with having stolen from him a bay horse, which said act is felonious according to the laws of Maryland, and punishable as such; - and it has been represented to me that he has fled from the justice of this State, and has taken refuge within the State of Pennsylvania.

Now therefore, Pursuant to the provisions of the Constitution and laws of the United States in such case made and provided, I do hereby request that the said James Connor to be apprehended and delivered to Simon Hays who is hereby duly authorized to receive and convey him to the State of Maryland, there to be dealt with according to law.

In Witness Whereof, I have hereunto affixed my name and the Great Seal of the State, this tenth day of October in the year of our Lords One thousand eight hundred and forty two.

This day made a requisition upon the Governor of Pennsylvania for a certain Henry Jackson who was indicted by the Grand Jurors of Cecil County for having aided and assisted several slaves the property of Stephen Myland to run away; - said requisition being in these words:

"State of Maryland, - To Wit:

I Francis Thomas, Governor of the State of Maryland,

To His Excellency the Governor of Pennsylvania.

It appears by the annexed Papers, duly authenticated according to the laws of this State, that a certain Henry Jackson (negro) was indicted by the Jurors of the State of Maryland for the County of Cecil for having aided and assisted certain negroes named Carter Stephenson, George W. Stephenson, Ann R. Stephenson, Charles M. Stephenson and Mary L. Stephenson to run away from a certain Stephen Myland, their lawful owner, they being his proper slaves, which said act of the aforesaid Henry Jackson is a crime and punishable as such by the laws of this State; and it has been represented to me that he has fled from the justice of this State, and has taken refuge within the State of Pennsylvania.

Now therefore, Pursuant to the provisions of the Constitution and laws of the United States in such case made and provided, I do hereby request that the said Henry Jackson (negro) to be apprehended and delivered to Simon McCullough who is hereby duly authorized to receive and convey him to the
