Nov 23<sup>rd</sup> 1842.

This day the Governor pardoned Ben Born who was convicted in Baltimore County Court of stealing a bee-hive, his pardon being recommended by the jury who convicted him; also pardoned Ellen Hughes who was convicted in Frederick County of having stolen three chickens and sentenced to two years confinement in the Penitentiary she being recommended by the Directors of the Penitentiary as a fit object of Executive clemency; also pardoned Charles P. Brown, who was convicted in Baltimore City Court of an assault with intent kill, he being recommended to Executive clemency by the Directors of the Penitentiary and a large number of citizens of Baltimore all of whom declare their belief of his innocence of the charge whereof he was convicted. Nov 24<sup>th</sup> 1842

The Governor this day remitted the fine of twenty dollars imposed upon Samuel Webb by Baltimore County Court for selling liquor without license, the same being recommended by both judges and jury of said Court.

Nov 29<sup>th</sup> 1842.

This day remitted forfeited recognizance of Benjamin Vandiver, entered into for his appearance at Harford County Court, to answer for an assault and battery, the same being recommended by the judges of Harford County Court, upon the ground that the failure of said Benjamin Vandiver to attend Harford County Court did not proceed from an disrespect to the Court, or an indisposition to do so, but because of mistake.

Nov 23<sup>rd</sup> 1842
