

June 17<sup>th</sup> 1843.

This day granted a requisition upon the Governor of this for the apprehension and surrender of A. Clark, alias A. Smith, the said requisition being in the following words:

"State of Maryland, - To Wit:

J. Francis Thomas, Governor of Maryland,

To His Excellency the Governor of this

It appears by the annexed Papers, duly authenticated according to the laws of this state, that a certain A. Clark, alias A. Smith, stands charged upon the oath of Daniel J. Foley, agent of the Baltimore and Ohio Rail Road Company, with having obtained from said Company, certain merchandise, by means of false pretences, which said act is a crime according to the laws of Maryland, and punishable as such, and it has been represented to me, that he has fled from the justice of this state, and has taken refuge in the state of this.

And therefore, pursuant to the provisions of the Constitution and laws of the United States in such case made and provided, I do hereby request that the said A. Clark, alias A. Smith, to be apprehended and delivered to John Zell who is hereby duly authorized to receive and convey him to the state of Maryland, there to be dealt with according to law.

In Witness whereof, I have hereunto affixed my name and the Great Seal of the State, this seventeenth day of June in the year of our Lord One Thousand Eight hundred and forty three.

This day the Governor directed the Sheriff of Baltimore County to surrender to William H. Stevens and James M. South agents of the State of New York, John Somerville, John Carpenter, and Thomas Lowner fugitives from the justice of said state.

This day the Governor appointed William T. Maddox clerk of the County Court for St. Mary's County, vice Joseph Harris resigned.

June 22<sup>nd</sup> 1843.

The Governor, this day granted the following Writ of Habeas Corpus.

"State of Maryland, - To Wit:

Whereas a certain Joseph Shea, and a certain Jacob Emory late of Baltimore City, stand charged by indictment of the Grand Jury of the said City, with having robbed the Mercantile Library Association of Baltimore; and whereas the said Joseph Shea, and Jacob Emory have been recommended to Executive Clemency by the Grand Jury of Baltimore City, and by a very large number of respectable citizens of Baltimore, who represent them to be small boys who had been enticed to the commission of the offence.
