

July 25th 1844.

This day, the Governor released the fine of twenty dollars, imposed by Baltimore City Court, at February Term 1844, upon James Campbell, the term of his imprisonment having expired, and he being recommended to mercy by respectable citizens.

July 30th 1844.

State of Maryland, - do Wit,

Whereas a certain John H. Pollack late of Baltimore County stands charged by Presentment of the Grand Jury of the said County, on a charge of attempting to utter a forged check on one of the Banks of the City of Baltimore;

And Whereas the said James H. Pollack has been recommended to Executive Clemency by two of the Judges of Baltimore City Criminal Court, and by other respectable citizens, who consider that his crime has been atoned for by most sincere penitence, and by the punishment he has already undergone;

Now therefore, I Francis Thomas Thomas, Governor of Maryland do hereby grant a Nolle Prosequi to the said John H. Pollack, on account of the aforesaid offence upon payment of the costs accrued upon said Presentment, and order and direct that all further proceedings against him on the presentment aforesaid do cease and determine, upon payment of the costs aforesaid, and that no further prosecution be had or carried on against him for or on account of said offence.

This day the Governor issued the following Order to the Sheriff of Baltimore County

To the Sheriff of Baltimore County, Greeting,

Whereas it appears to me from certain documents transmitted to me by His Excellency the Governor of Virginia that Charles S. Smith, stands charged with the crime of Felony, committed in the said State, and that having fled from the justice of that State he has taken refuge in the State of Maryland, and it appearing that he is now in your custody; and Whereas His Excellency has demanded him as a fugitive from justice, Now therefore there are to authorize you to deliver the said Charles S. Smith to Lincoln Blay, the Agent appointed by His Excellency the Governor of Virginia to receive and convey him to the said State - the said Agent first paying all the costs and charges of the arrest and detention of the said Charles S. Smith. For all which this shall be your sufficient warrant and
