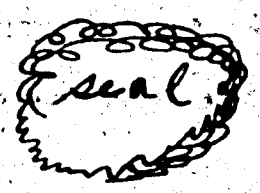


Requisition
for Mary
Bramble & al.
granted

of the United States for the District of Columbia.
Whereas a certain Mary Bramble, also Mary Lucky Barry
alias Mary Coyle, and a certain Martha Louise Bramble, have been charged by
the affidavit of Alice Cannon & Tabitha Cannon of the City of Baltimore in
this State with having on the _____ day of October in the year 1844 committed
the crimes of Robbery and Kidnapping. And whereas the said Parties have
fled from the justice of this State and are now confined in the jail of
Washington County in the District of Columbia charged with some other
offence; and it being necessary that the perpetrators of such offences
should be brought to justice - Now therefore I Thomas G. Pratt Gov. of the
State of Maryland, by virtue of the authority vested in me by the Constitution
and laws of the United States, do hereby demand the said Mary Bramble
alias Mary Lucky Barry alias Mary Coyle, and the said Martha Louise
Bramble as fugitives from the justice of this State and make known to your
Honor, that I have appointed James H. McKnight my Agent to receive the
said fugitives and bring them to this State having jurisdiction of the said
offences, that they may be brought to trial therefor. In compliance with
the law I herein to annex the affidavits upon which this demand is
founded which I certify to be duly authenticated according to the
laws of this State -

& Warrin of the City of Baltimore and addressed to the said Wilkins & Warrin

Gentlemen

I have examined the papers enclosed in your favour of the 7th
inst. asking for a requisition on the Gov. of V^a for the delivery of Isaac
Wamsley - I do not think the requisition should be granted on the
affidavits which you enclosed to me. They do not believe the
statements made by Wamsley. It is true the affidavits do state
that the deponents have been informed on undoubted authority
that the representations made by Wamsley are false &c, but
