

The tolls authorized by the provisions of the said Act  
 Now whereas by the Act of Assembly passed at December  
 Session 1834 Chap. 286. The Governor was authorized to license  
 the said roads in the same manner as provided for in the  
 said Act of 1827 Chap. 186. Now whereas the General Insurance  
 Company of Maryland have become the proprietors of said  
 roads Now therefore I Tho. G. Pratt Governor of the State  
 of Maryland do hereby license the said President & Managers  
 of the General Insurance Company of Maryland to erect  
 & fit so many gates upon & across the said roads as may  
 be necessary to collect the tolls authorized to be collected by  
 the Act of 1827 Chap. 186.

Proclamation  
 Tho. G. Pratt Governor of Maryland  
 Do all whom these presents may concern  
 Whereas I have received from the judges of Election in  
 the several Counties of this State & of the City of Baltimore  
 returns of an Election held on Wednesday the first day of  
 October 1845 for Members to represent this State in the  
 Congress of the United States and have carefully ascertained  
 the number of votes given for every person voted for as  
 such. Now therefore in pursuance of the law in such  
 case made & provided, I do by this my proclamation  
 declare that John G. Chapman of the first District Thomas  
 Perry of the second District J. Matthews Ligon of the third  
 District Wm. A. Giles of the fourth District Albert Constable  
 of the fifth District & Edward Long of the sixth District  
 appear by the said returns to have had the highest  
 number of votes in their respective Districts and were duly  
 elected Members to represent this State in the Congress of the  
 United States
