### A. Proclamation by the Gov. of Maryland

Annapolis May 21<sup>st</sup> 1846

Proclamation  
Whereas, The Congress of the United States has declared "that a state of War exists between the United States and the Republic of Mexico," and has authorized the President of the United States "to employ the Militia, Naval, and Military forces of the United States, and to call for and accept the services of any number of Volunteers not exceeding 50,000, to serve twelve months after they shall have arrived at the places of rendezvous, or to the end of the War, unless sooner discharged, according to the time for which they shall have been mustered into service" and, Whereas, the President, with the view of securing to the Citizens of each State and Territory the privilege of participating in the defence of their Country, has apportioned the said Volunteer force among
