

October 15th 1851

✓ The Governor this day, upon the recommendation of George Vickers and J. D. Ricard, Esqs. and many other highly respectable citizens of Kent County, pardoned Samuel Baldwin, who was convicted on indictment in Kent County Court at the May term 1851, of an assault on a certain Ebenezer Watts, and sentenced to be confined in the County jail of Kent County for five months from the 3^d of June 1851, and pay a fine of one dollar.

October 14th 1851

The Governor this day made the following Military Appointments and issued commissions by: George J. Zimmerman, Captain of the Independent Light Dragoons 5th Cavalry Regt. M. M. vice Moulden resigned, Edward Wood 1st Lt. of same company vice Zimmerman promoted, Philip H. Menger, Captain of the Jackson Guards 5th Regt. M. V., and Valentine Gerhart 3^d Lt. Taylor German Light Dragoons 5th Cavalry Regt. M. M.

October 17th 1851

The Governor this day appointed and commissioned Ciprian Ferrandini, Ensign of the "Baltimore City Guards" attached to the 53rd Regiment M. V. I.

October 18th 1851

The Governor this day appointed and commissioned John F. Reese, Notary Public to reside at Westminster, Carroll County; also received and approved his bond.

October 22nd 1851

This day the Governor Appointed and Commissioned Emanuel St. Gerualdo Auctioneer for the City of Baltimore

October 24th 1851

The Governor this day issued the following Proclamation.

Enoch Louis Lowe, Governor of Maryland:

To all Whom these presents may Concern:

Whereas, I have received from the Judges of Election in the several Congressional Districts of this State, Returns of an election held on Wednesday the 10th day of October, 1851, for Members of represent this State in the Congress of the United States, and have carefully ascertained the number of votes given for each person voted for as such.

Now therefore, in pursuance of the law in such cases made and provided, I do by this, My Proclamation, declare, that Richard J. Brown of the First District; William J. Hamilton; of the Second District; Edward Hammond of the Third District; Thomas Yates Walsh, of the Fourth District; Alexander Evans of the Fifth District, appear by the said Returns, to have received the highest number of votes in their respective Districts, and were duly elected Members to represent this State in the Congress of the United States.
