The Governor this day issued the following license:
State of Maryland: To Wit:

To all Whom it may concern:

Be it known, that, whereas Sterling Galt, John Swopes, William Frizell, Christian Cull, and Peter Lyrabill, the Commissioners appointed, in pursuance of the several Acts of the General Assembly of Maryland, passed at December Session, 1846, Chapter 242, and December Session, 1849, Chapter 237, have, in accordance with the requirements of the said laws, reported to me that they have completed five Miles of the Turn-pike Road, named in said Acts, on the line thereof, lying between the towns of Westminster and Taneytown, in Carroll County, as provided for in the ninth Section of the said Act of December Session, 1846, Chapter 242; and whereas it also appears that the said Commissioners have filed their bonds in the Office of the Clerk of Carroll County Court (now the Circuit Court for Carroll County,) duly approved, according to law, and that they have also complied with the prerequisites of the Acts of Assembly aforesaid; and whereas, in such case, it is provided, by the said Act of Assembly, passed at the December Session, 1849, Chapter 237, Section 7, that the Governor shall issue a license, for the erection of a toll gate, upon said Turn-pike road. Now therefore, I, Enoch Lewis Lowe, Governor of the State of Maryland, do issue this license and authority to the said Commissioners, by which they are authorized and empowered to erect a toll-gate on the said road, upon the completed part thereof, within the limits aforesaid, as contemplated by the said several Acts of Assembly. And this shall be their sufficient license and authority for the same.
