

February 19th 1852

The Governor this day issued the following requisition:
State of Maryland. To wit:

Enoch Louis Lowe, Governor of the State of Maryland,
To His Excellency, the Governor of Virginia.

It appears by the annexed papers, duly authenticated, according to the laws of this State, that a certain William Dermody, late of Washington County in this State, did on the 26th day of January, 1852, discharge and shoot with a pistol a certain Joseph Norman inflicting on the said Norman a wound by which he was instantly killed, and it has been represented to me that he fled from the jurisdiction of this State, and has taken refuge within the State of Virginia.

Now therefore, Pursuant to the provisions of the Constitution and Laws of the United States in such case made and provided, I do hereby request that the said William Dermody be apprehended and delivered to Christopher Hillard, Esq., Sheriff of Washington County aforesaid, who is hereby duly authorized to receive and convey him to the State of Maryland, there to be dealt with according to law.

In Witness Whereof I have hereunto affixed my name, and the Great Seal of the State, this nineteenth day of February in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and fifty two.

Gentlemen of the Senate and House of Delegates:

I have just received, and herewith transmit, copies of the message of His Excellency, the Governor, and of a letter of the Attorney General of Louisiana, in regard to the McDonough succession, communicated to the Legislature of that State, on the 22nd ultimo.

You will perceive that the strongest reasons existed to justify the course pursued by the States of Louisiana and Maryland, for the vindication of their claims under the Will of the testator.
