Chase to be Justice of the peace to reside at Canton, agreeably to the list of nominations of the 25<sup>th</sup> of February last; also advised and consented to the appointments severally of Inspector General of Flour and Assistant Inspectors of Flour, Weigh Master of Live Stock, Inspectors of Leather, State Agricultural Chemist, State Wharfinger, Chief Inspector of Fish, and Sub Inspectors, Inspector of Plaster of Paris, Inspector and Weighers of Hay, Inspector of Lime, Inspector of Ground Black Oak Bark, Inspectors and Cordons of Fire Wood, Inspector of Cumber, agreeably to the nominations of the 25<sup>th</sup> of February last; also advised and consented to the appointments severally of certain persons to be Justices of the peace for Howard County agreeably to the nomination of the 25<sup>th</sup> of February last; also advised and consented to the appointments severally of certain persons to be Justices of the peace for Worcester County, agreeably to the nominations of the 25<sup>th</sup> of February last.

This day the Governor issued the following requisition:

State of Maryland - To wit:

Enoch Louis Lowe Governor of the State of Maryland,

To His Excellency, the Governor of South Carolina

It appears by the annexed papers, duly authenticated according to the laws of this State, that a certain A. Riddle stands charged upon the affidavit of William H. Dorsey, one of the Firm of Small, Keighley & Dorsey of the City of Baltimore with the crime of receiving stolen money knowing it to have been stolen, against the form of the act of the General Assembly of this State, and it has been represented to me that he has fled from the justice of this and has taken refuge within the State of South Carolina.

Now therefore, pursuant to the Constitutional provisions and laws of the United States in such case made and provided, I do hereby request that the said A. Riddle be
