April 27th 1852

The Governor this day nominated, at the suggestion of the Senate, James S. Finley for Notary Public, to reside in the City of Baltimore; also nominated W. H. Ballard Johnson for Notary Public to reside in the City of Baltimore.

This day the Governor received a message from the Senate informing him that they advised and consented to the appointment of W. H. Ballard Johnson as Notary Public to reside in the City of Baltimore, and refused to consent and advise the appointment of James S. Finley to be Notary Public for Baltimore City.

April 29th 1852 This day appointments for several of the Counties were commissioned. See Book of Executive Nominations.

April 30th

The Governor this day, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, commissioned John Carroll Selgrand, Chief Justice of the Court of Appeals; also issued commissions to appointees for several of the Counties & Balt. City - see Book of Executive Nominations; also

This day the Governor received a message from the Senate notifying him that they advised and consented to the appointments severally of Civil Officers for Queen Anne's County agreeably to the nominations of the 25th of February last, except for Justices of the District Court, Chief Judge of the Orphan's Court, James W. Price to be Coroner (who has removed from the County) Samuel Stinson, for Justice of the peace (who has deceased), Benjamin Coppage and George Spry, for Justices of the peace (who have been elected County Commissioners)

May 1st 1852

The Governor this day received a communication from the Senate informing him that they advised and consented to the appointment of Marcus R. Hoell as Inspector and Weigher of Coal in Baltimore City, agreeably to the nomination of the 25th of February last. Also this day nominated to the Senate James P. Archer as Notary Public for the City of Baltimore. Also issued a Commission to Marcus R. Hoell, Inspector of Coal.

The Governor this day transmitted to the Senators and Representatives of Maryland in the Congress of the United States copies of joint resolutions, passed by the present General Assembly, in regard to the comparative value of Anthracite, and the semi-bituminous Coal of Allegany County, in this State, as examined and reported upon by C. R. Stewart under instructions from the Secretary of the Navy of the United States, and other particulars in relation thereto.

May 3rd

This day a message was received from the Senate notifying the Governor that they advised and consented to the appointment of James P. Archer to be Notary Public to reside in the City of Baltimore, agreeably to the nomination of the 1st of May inst.

Also this day issued commissions to James L. Norris, Notary Public for Frederick and W. H. Ballard Johnson, Notary Public for Baltimore City.
