

June 11th 1852

The Governor this day Commissioned Mountjoy D. Suckett, Patrick O'Neill and Michael Byrne, visitors of St. John's Literary Institution, in Frederick City.

June 18th

The Governor this day, upon the recommendation of Judge Perry, the Jury who tried the case, the Officers of the Court, Members of the Bar of Allegany, Washington and Frederick Courts, and a large number of the most respectable citizens said Counties, granted a pardon in favor of William Dermody, who was convicted, on indictment, in the Criminal Circuit Court for Washington County, at March Term 1852, of Manslaughter and sentenced to confinement in the Penitentiary for two years from the 16th day of April 1852.

June 22^d

This day the Governor ordered publication to be made in the "Sun" and "Argus" of the application for the pardon of a certain James Whealan, who was convicted at the January Term 1850, of Baltimore City Court of an assault with intent to kill a certain Chatham Hughlett, and sentenced therefor to be confined in the Penitentiary until the first day of July 1852.

June 23^d

The Governor this day Commissioned Edward Stock, Justice of the Peace for Worcester County, vice Thomas B. Purnell resigned.

Also refused the application for the remission of a fine imposed on Charles H. Downer, of Calvert County, who was convicted by the Court of said County for selling liquor to a slave.

June 25th

The Governor this day Commissioned Thomas Fawcett, Justice of the Peace for Montgomery County, vice Benjamin Fawcett, declared to be ineligible; also Commissioned John M. McCullough, Inspector of Lumber at Port Deposit, vice William McCullough, deceased; also Commissioned John White, Justice of the Peace, vice John M. McNeil, declined.

June 28th 1852

The Governor this day pardoned James Whealan, a convict in the Penitentiary, for whom notice for publication was issued the 22^d inst.

Also remitted a fine of ten dollars imposed upon Joseph Peters, by the Criminal Court for Baltimore City at May Term 1852, for selling goods without license.

June 29th

The Governor this day disallowed a claim of fourteen dollars presented as being due to Mr Pole of Philadelphia for arresting Hoyt, alias O'Connell.
