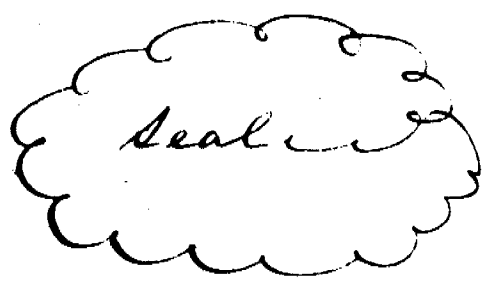

Now therefore I, Enoch Louis Lowe, Governor of the State of Maryland, do designate and set apart Thursday the 25th of November next, as a day of thanksgiving to Almighty God, to be kept and observed by the good People of the State of Maryland: - Whom I earnestly exhort, on that day carefully to abstain from all secular employments, and to devote themselves to such religious services and exercises as are appropriate to a day of thanksgiving and prayer.



Given Under My Hand, and the Great Seal of the State of Maryland, this twenty fifth day of October in the year of our Lord, one thousand eight hundred and fifty two, and of the Independence of the United States the twenty seventh.
