

November 17th 1852.

The Governor this day, upon the recommendation of States Attorney, Franklin, remitted a fine of fifty dollars imposed, by the Circuit Court for Anne Arundell County, upon a certain James R. White for selling spiritous liquors without license.

November 19th

The Governor this day commissioned sundry Civil Officers - see Book of Executive Appointments.

November 20th

The Governor this day, upon the recommendation of Judges Chamber, Hopper and Eccleston, remitted a fine of ten dollars imposed by the Talbot County Court, November Term 1851, upon a certain James H. Smythe for selling without a license.

November 23^d

This day the Governor, upon the recommendation of Judges William H. Tuck and Peter W. Crain and many other highly respectable citizens of Prince Georges County, remitted a fine of one hundred dollars imposed upon a certain Clement J. Hillary by the Circuit Court for Prince Georges County, at November Term 1852, for charging illegal fees as Justice of the Peace.

Also this day remitted a fine of thirty dollars, which was imposed upon a certain Michael Sullivan by the Criminal Court for Baltimore City, at September Term 1852, for assaulting and beating Edward G. Sturgeon.

November 24th

The Governor this day appointed and commissioned Philip Beatts, Justice of the Peace for Prince Georges County, vice G. Roby declined.

November 25th

This day the Governor issued the following Proclamation:

State of Maryland - To Wit:

Whereas, Returns have been received by me from the Judges of Election in the several Counties of the State, and of the City of Baltimore, of an election held on Tuesday, the second day of November, for electors of President and Vice President of the United States. And, Whereas, the number of votes given for each person voted for as such, has been carefully ascertained by me.

Now, Therefore, I, Enoch Lewis Lova, Governor of the State of Maryland, in pursuance of the Act of Assembly in such case made and provided, do by this my Proclamation, declare that Robert M. McLane, Cathell Humphreys, John Parran, Richard H. Alvey, Carroll Spence, Charles J. M. Gwin, Joseph A. Nickles and Ephraim K. Wilson, Esquires, appear by said Returns to have received the highest number of votes in the State of Maryland, and are duly elected Electors of President and Vice President of the United States.
