

6th.

The Governor refused to grant a pardon to John Tydings, convicted at April Term 1852, of the heinous crime of larceny in Anne Arundel County, of larceny.

10th.

The Governor issued his warrant to the Sheriff of Caroline County for the delivery of a certain William Cornish, charged with Murder, to Henry Pratt, Agent of the State of Delaware under a Requisition.

12th.

The Governor commanded the Sheriff of Baltimore City to take to the place of execution a certain Thomas Connor, convicted in the Criminal Court of Baltimore City, at January Term 1853, of the crime of Murder, and there hang him by the neck until he shall be dead, at or before the hour of one P. M. on Friday, the eighth of July proximo.

14th.

The Governor received an order from the House of Delegates requesting him to communicate any correspondence he may have had with the President of the Baltimore and Susquehanna Rail Road Company touching its ability to pay to the State the interest due on its liabilities; which correspondence was sent to the House of Delegates.

18th.

The Governor received an order of the House of Delegates requesting him to employ counsel to investigate whether or not certain incorporated companies in the City of Baltimore do not hold real estate contrary to the provisions of their charters.

The Governor assigned R. T. Merrick and Lewis Spencer Esquires, under the above referred to order, as counsel; and said gentlemen accepted the trust.

20th.

The Governor transmitted to the General Assembly a Message relative to the preparation of Indexes, under Resolution No. 50 of December Session 1849, stating that he had no power to award compensation for such service, by reason of the provision of the new Constitution altering the manner of disbursement from the Treasury, and also prescribing the conditions thereof.

24th.

The Governor transmitted to the General Assembly copies of a letter received from the Secretary of War of the United States, declining to furnish a transcript of the Muster and Pay Rolls of the War of 1812, so far as they relate to the soldiers
