The Governor remitted a fine of Fifty dollars imposed by the Circuit Court for Howard County on John Lookerland, for selling liquor contrary to law, on the recommendation of Judge Brewer.

22^d.
The Governor pardoned John F. Sequin, convicted of Forgery in the Baltimore City Court at September Term 1851. (See Record of Pardons.)

23^d.
The Governor directed notice of application for pardon of James E. Work, convicted at November Term 1848, of the Talbot County Court, and at the November Term 1848, of the Queen Anne's County Court, of aiding in the escape of certain slaves, to be published; to expire December 14th. proximo.

25th.
The Governor issued his proclamation of the election of John R. Franklin, Jacob Shover, Joshua Hansant, Henry May, William J. Hamilton and A. R. Sellers Esquires, to represent the State of Maryland in the Congress of the United States.

28th.
The Governor transmitted to the Secretary of State of the United States, to the Clerk of the House of Representatives, and to each of the gentlemen elected, a certificate of return of election of members of Congress for the State of Maryland.

29th.
The Governor directed notice of application for pardon of William Watson, convicted in Baltimore City Court at September 1850, of Felony to be published; to expire December 14th. proximo.

The Governor refused to pardon John Miller and John Pennington convicted in the Criminal Court of Baltimore City, at September Term 1853, of assault with intent to Kill.

The Governor remitted a fine of one hundred dollars severally imposed on John Miller and John Pennington for assault with intent to Kill.

30th.
The Governor approved the bond of W. Pickney Whyte Esq. elected Comptroller of the Treasury.

The Governor remitted a fine of Twenty dollars imposed on Owen Loftus, by the Circuit Court for Allegany County for selling liquor on the Sabbath day.
