January 3.

The Governor pardoned Charles Riley, convicted of Larceny, in the Criminal Court of Baltimore, at January Term, 1860, and sentenced to the Penitentiary for the term of Eight years and three months.

On the same day the Governor pardoned Charles Vogelstine, convicted of assault with intent to murder, in the Circuit Court for Anne Arundel county, at April Term, 1860, and sentenced to the Penitentiary for three years.

January 4.

The Governor remitted the forfeiture of a Recognizance by James B. Hance, of Kent county, for six hundred dollars, for the appearance of Jacob R. Miller at the April Term, 1860, of the Circuit Court for Kent county.

On the same day, the Governor remitted the fine of fifty dollars, imposed upon Ellen Finn by the Circuit Court for Allegany county, at October term, 1860, for selling liquor without license.

On the same day the Governor transmitted to the House of Delegates the following Message:

State of Maryland
Executive Chamber,

Annapolis, January 4, 1862.

Gentlemen of the House of Delegates:

At the session of the General Assembly of 1860, a law was passed appropriating \$70,000 for the purchase of arms and accoutrements; and authorising the Governor and Adjutant General to make the
