Same day the Governor appointed Sebastian F. Sturter of Baltimore City as Agent on the part of the State to visit the sick and wounded Maryland Soldiers in the various U.S. Hospitals in this State and elsewhere, to provide for their comfort, and aid them in securing their pay, and their discharges in all cases where such services would be proper. See letter book page 405.

March 14<sup>th</sup>

The Governor issued his requisition upon the Honorable James Dunlop Chief Judge of the Circuit Court of the U.S. for the District of Columbia for the rendition of one Robert Scott late of Baltimore County who stands charged upon Indictment of the Grand Jury of said County with the crime of stealing one mare, one saddle and one bridle of the property of Thomas G. Mays and appointed Joseph Walker Sheriff of said County to take charge of the fugitive.

March 17<sup>th</sup>

The Governor commissioned Lewis Clark as an Auctioneer for Baltimore City.

March 18<sup>th</sup>

The Governor being informed that the Commission issued on the 11<sup>th</sup> February last to Septimus Claypool as Assistant Inspector of grain has not been taken by him from the Clerk's office of the Superior Court but that said failure arose from no purpose to decline said appointment and that he is now prepared to accept and qualify, issued another Commission to him as Inspector aforesaid.

March 20<sup>th</sup>

The Governor directed publication of notice of an application for pardon in the case of Alexander Walsh convicted of Burglary in the Circuit Court for Baltimore County at March term 1857 and sentenced to the Penitentiary for eleven years and five months.
