but really the Accounts that are given in the Gazette do not in-  
cline One to entertain a very high Opinion of the Men under his  
Command or to think that their Appearance will strike the In-  
dians with Terror or Respect. I presume You have before this  
time seen a particular Journal of the Operations of the Troops that  
were employed last Year up the River St. Lawrence. Should You  
not perhaps the Journal printed in the Gazette herewith transmitted  
will afford You some Satisfaction. The Issue of that Expedition  
was truly glorious far exceeding I believe most Peoples Expectations,  
& heartily congratulate You thereupon & upon the many other signal  
Successes with which God was pleased during the Course of the last  
Year to bless His Majesty's Arms.
