The Governor and Council having ordered the principal Part of the Powder in
the Magazine kept by you to Frederick Town, and a good many Waggon's being expected
down for the Removal of it, you will deliver to each a Load as they apply to you, taking
a Receipt for the Casks delivered and sending a Memorandum by each, four Waggon's
will apply with this and I would have you stop others as they may be coming down.

You will be attentive that the Casks are in good Order, such as are not, must be kept
for Repair or Use here. If eight Waggon's or more get out together, it is our Intention
you send a Guard of two or three Men with them. The Powder is to be delivered
to Maj: Benj: Johnson of Frederick Town, each Waggon I suppose will carry 23
or 25 Barrels, a little better than a Ton Gross.
