Capt. Rogers. We have 20 Mts. of Tobacco which we shall endeavour to send  
you in our Boats to Pungoteage, with that and the Slave which goes  
down in the Gallies; beyond what will complete the Molly's Load,  
N. 216. you will load the General Smallwood and proceed with her to the  
Address of Mr. Garrison at Martimes. If we should not be able to  
send the Whole of the 20 Mts., or if the General Smallwood will take  
more than the 20 Mts. and the surplus of the Slave, we would have  
you purchase what is deficient of Tobacco or any Thing else, which  
can be conveniently and speedily got. We expect Mr. Garrison will,  
if he can, furnish you with a Load of Salt back and, on your Return,  
we wish you to get into the Bay, but we do not intend to tie you up  
so, but that you may use your Discretion to make an Inlet, in  
case you think attempting the Bay is too hazardous. —

217. and that you have since sold him as a Substitute to Mr. Nich.

to see you tomorrow in the fore Part of the Day - If any Person  
was present at the Transaction who will tend to prove it fair,  
you had better prevail on him to come with you. —

In Council Annapolis 19<sup>th</sup> May 1778.

Sir. The Rev<sup>d</sup>. Mr. Brown has represented to us that John Vaughan, who  
he alleges had contracted to serve him two Years from the Month  
910 of January last on Wages, was taken from his Labor by Capt<sup>r</sup>. Byas  
and McKeel, forcibly, and wounded by the former, and that afterwards  
he took the Bounty. Mr. Brown further represents that the Loss of  
this Man's Service will be highly prejudicial to him and proposes to  
furnish a Recruit in his Stead who shall be approved by you, as  
fully equal to Vaughan. We wish the Service, where it can be as  
effectually forwarded, may prove as little prejudicial as possible to  
Individuals and therefore on a Recruit being furnished who you judge  
fully as good as Vaughan, in his Stead, we request you will suffer  
him to stay and procure from Col<sup>r</sup>. Richardson, as soon as you can, his  
Discharge, which, we have no Doubt will be readily granted, on the  
Col<sup>r</sup>. being informed of the Terms, that they are complied with and that  
it is our Request. —
