In Council Annapolis 7<sup>th</sup> Augt. 1770.

Sir. We are desirous of sending the Defence a Voyage to Nantz and 292. of placing you Captain in her; we therefore request you'll come over and converse with us on the Subject — We are &c.

In Council 7<sup>th</sup> Aug<sup>t</sup>. 1770.

Sir. By an Act of the General Assembly of this State passed in October Session, it is directed that "there be set apart by the Governor & Council the sum of one hundred and thirty thousand Dollars out of the first Money collected in Virtue of that Act, that can be spared from Defraying 293. the necessary Expences of this State, to comply with the first Quarterly Payment, according to the late Requisition of Congress" — The Expences which have been incurred in the course of this Year have been chiefly on Account of the United States and are very considerable, Our Treasury is in such a state that we cannot, at present, pay in more than fifty thousand Dollars, which are set apart according to the Act and will be paid at any time to the Order of Congress. It is unlikely that this State will be able to pay in anything further, til the 20<sup>th</sup> of Nov<sup>r</sup>. when a Heavy Assessment is to be paid into the Treasury, which will, we expect, fully answer this Year's Quota of this State.

In Council 8<sup>th</sup> Aug<sup>t</sup>. 1770.

Sir. We received your Letter of the 20<sup>th</sup> July by Capt. Irving. We are sorry that we have no better Means of securing atrocious Offenders, and that we can, with Propriety, do nothing more than to approve your Conduct in placing a Guard over the Prison, and desire a continuance of it. It was mentioned in the course of last Session, to empower the Governor and Council to remove Persons committed for Capital Offences, from the County Jails to which they might be committed, to others of greater Security, but the power was not given —
