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M. 390. that very lately, there was Flour on Hand sufficient for 30 Days ~~of~~ ^{estimated} & besides a considerable Quantity of Wheat, we fear that this Report may not be true but we have frequently heard that there are considerable Quantities of Wheat collected at the Mills in Stamford and Læsil for the use of the Army and large Quantities of Flour lying at and constantly transporting from the Head of Elk. Pray obtain and transmit us as early as possible, the best Information you can on this Subject, that we may be enabled to exercise the discretionary Power lodged in our Hands to our own Satisfaction and the Public Expectation. The Stills are stopped, but the internal Demand and that from Massachusetts will, we fear, still raise the Price; the Board of War in Massachusetts, has given a Power to purchase Flour &c in this State to the Amount of 60,000⁰⁰ lawful Money. You have also inclosed a copy of a Resolution concerning the Recruiting Service, occasioned by the Resolution of Congress of the 9th Inst. which came to Hand on Tuesday 8 O'clock at Night; it was late in the Session as well as late in the Year for Business of this Nature. We have no late Returns of our Troops, nor have we, at any Time, had them so exact as is desirable, but we have Reason to believe our Quota has not been so deficient as that of most of the States. We have never had any credit for the Men enlisted in our State by Pennsylvania or Delaware, for those of the Flying Camp stopped and enlisted in Philadelphia, there were more than a Regiment of the first and three hundred of the latter at least, & far those of Count Pulaski's Legion enlisted in this State, of whom we never had a Return, they were more than 100. Major Lee also enlisted some Men in our State the latter Part of last Winter & in the Spring, we believe, upwards of twenty, if none before Count Pulaski's Recruits are discounted, they ought, according to the Resolution of Congress of

Under too what is become of Col. Heath's Regt., a great Part of it was raised in this State. But these facts we apprehend, when other States are eased of a Part of their Quota ought to have influenced the easing this State of a Part of the eight Regiments and the Scarcity of Men and the Price of Labour strongly claim it in this State, however the Assembly are very desirous to strengthen the Army as much as they possibly can and our Legislature as well as our Duty concur with them. We inclose you a Bill of the Assembly which we hope will occasion our Particulars the Officers of each there are Men of great Merit who have been too much neglected.
