

Council April 19th 1779.

We received yours of the 8th Instant & have sent the Platier & Dolphin, ~~for the Gallies~~ for the Gallies. The Commodore receives by this Opportunity, Instructions to extend the Cruise a Month longer than was intended, provided you can prevail on your Men to remain for that Time. We expect the Committee of Baltimore have advised you on the Subject & informed you that a Vessel of 20 guns from Philadelphia and the latter commanded by Capt Cunningham are to cruise on the Coast and will soon be ready for Sea.

In Council April 19th 1779.

Sir: We have received yours of the 8th Instant by Capt Bryan of the Dolphin, who has had all the Assistance we could give in loading with Expedition and now returns with the Platier, with a double Quantity of every Kind of Provisions you requested, a few Articles excepted, which were not to be had in Baltimore, and which are not thought to be materially necessary. It is our Wish that you cruise three Months instead of two intended, provided Capt. Nicholson can prevail on his Officers and Men to remain so long in the Service. Frequent Complaints having been made to this Board that the Sound is infested by a Parcel of daring Vultures in a small Vessel and that some Vessels have actually been taken & others plundered by them, you are to send the Dolphin Tender, if she can possibly be spared, with the Platier immediately up the Sound to cooperate with Col^o Geo. Dashille in endeavouring to secure the Vessel and Crew. Col^o Dashille shall be advised of this Order in Time to give every Assistance to the Dolphin & Platier and, should they want Men, we have no Doubt of their getting Volunteers for this necessary Duty.

In Council Annapolis 13th April 1779.

Sir: The Governor wrote you the 26th Ult^o in Answer to yours of the 14th which we imagine had not reached you when we wrote on the 29th in which you were informed of the Resolution of the Assembly respecting the Staff Officers Claim to the 100 Dollars and that by another of their Resolutions this Board is authorized to recharge all Bills of the Emissions of May 20th 1777 & April 11th 1778 that have issued out of the Treasury of this State, provided Application be made for that Purpose before the 20th May next. Inclosed you will receive Arrangements of the Officers of the 3^d, 5th, and 6th Regts Specifying the Times of their Appointments in the first instance and their Promotion and Succession to Vacancies in 1777. The Resolution of this Board is to permit those who have applied for Leave to go into New England to go no farther than the Lines, and from this we have but seldom deviated and this last we wish not to add to the Instances, not finding a sufficient Number of Men
