We yesterday received your Letter of the 23<sup>d</sup>. Inst. & this incloses you a Certificate of your Appointment, we cannot account for the miscarriage of the first N<sup>o</sup> 32. on any Supposition but the Negligence of the Sheriff, which is intolerable with Respect to public Letters. Capt. Richardson of Montgomery, a Continental Purchaser, was reappointed by us, he chooses to draw the Money as before from the Continent for the convenience of getting Accounts; if equally suitable to you, it would be agreeable to us you should do so; but not, we hope an Col<sup>o</sup> Hyde's Return, to be able to furnish you fully; he is gone to Philad<sup>a</sup> for Money for that Purpose. The Demand on us is only for 10,000 Barls, 2000 by the first of next Month, 3000 by the 1<sup>st</sup> of June & 5000 in that Month. We look on it that we have upwards of 3000 Barls in Wheat & Flour secured. The convenience of Transporting to the Head of Elk, where we have requested all Flour to be sent to the Direction of Col<sup>o</sup> Hollingsworth, makes it desirable to get as much as may be in your Neighbourhood, we wish you to push it forward as quick as you can. Our Letter was not intended to give you any责  
fines or convey an Idea of our thinking you blameable; we have appointed Gentlemen in Kent who, we are confident, will attend to their Purchase with Diligence & Honor, and we think it desirable for the Purposes of Regularity & to prevent public Purchasers from being made Use of against each other, that each be confined to his own County.

We have the strongest Reliance that you will conduct this affair to the best of your Ability for the Publick, the most for the general Interest.

P.S. Advise us frequently of the Situation of your Purchase
