Having directed the Purchasers of our Appointment to send to your care, all  
M<sup>r</sup>s. flour they might procure for carriage to Christen, some of it may reach you  
stands before different Orders may get to the Purchasers under letters we  
received by this Day's Post and therefore we now request that all such  
flour as you may receive from any of the Gentlemen of our Appointment  
may be carefully stored at the Head of Elk to wait the Orders of the  
Commissioners for Superintending the Purchasing Company's and  
Quarter Master's Departments or those of Sir W<sup>r</sup> a.

Sir. John Ward Neazey one of the Purchasers in Cecil wrote us the 1<sup>st</sup>  
Ins<sup>t</sup>. for twenty thousand Pounds to be delivered to the Bearer Mr. George  
Nickars, who he had sent for it. Mr. Nickars will probably meet you,  
if he does, deliver him the twenty thousand Pounds for Mr. Neazey to  
be laid out in the Purchase, taking his Receipt hereon

Sir. From a Letter received by the last Post, we are induced, so far as to  
change our former Instructions to you as, instead of sending the Flour  
forward to the Head of Elk, that you'll have it carried to & safely stored  
at the most convenient Landings on the Waters of this Bay, from  
whence it may be readily sent off by Water & further, that you'll send  
us an Account of the particular Quantity you may have at each  
Place the 20<sup>th</sup> Ins<sup>t</sup>, in the mean Time write us how Matters go on every  
Week We are &c.

Infancil Annapolis 3<sup>d</sup> May 1779

Sir. We sent Col<sup>r</sup> Hyde & M<sup>r</sup> Howard to Philadelphia for Money; they were  
delayed longer than we expected, but we hear they were to set off last  
Friday, they were to come by Way of the Eastern Shore and had our  
Directions to call and leave Money with several Purchasers. If they  
have not come out of your Reach, be pleased to shew them this, which  
shall be their Warrant to leave with you the twenty thousand Pounds  
you want, if you do not get the Money from them, we will send it to  
you as soon as it gets here, which we dare say will be in two or three  
Days at most. We would have the Wheat immediately ground up,  
the Sharts & Bran only separated from the Flour & contrived to H.  
Hollingsworth for Storage; such of the Flour as may lie equally con-  
venient to Landings on Delaware as on Chesapeake, we wish to remain  
at the Mills where it is or may be; that which is more convenient to  
Landings on this Bay, we request may, with all Expedition, be brought &  
stored at convenient Landings on the Bay. We request further that you'll  
send us an Account of your Purchase to the 20<sup>th</sup> Ins<sup>t</sup> distinguishing the Places  
where the Flour &c. may then be. We hope you will be attentive to this  
Part because a general Account is desired from us.
