mediately to Baltimore, as many of the Militia of his County as he can  
arm. The Park sent up in the Genl. Smallwood & the Flour purchased  
by Mr. Gouane, we would have applied to the Subsistence of the Militia  
you will be pleased to direct it to be placed in a safe and convenient  
Situation. Neither of the Look out Boats have yet come in. Pray
