

In Council Annapolis 16th July 1779

In our letter of the 11th June, we informed you that Mr. Morris, by his Letter by
yesterdays Post, desired a Part of the Slaves purchased in this State, to be delivered to
the Commiss^r of Supply, and we requested you that you would deliver to the Commiss^r of Supply, respecting
the Head of Elk, all the Slaves which remained in your Hands of the Purchase of this
State, we also, on the same Day, wrote a like Letter to Mr. J. Gilpin & Mr. J. W. Coazey
informing them that what was sent forward and what then remained in your Hands & those
Baltimore's Hands would amount to about 5000 Bars^s, the Quantity ordered for this
State. We have received by this Post, a Letter from Mr. Morris desiring a different
Disposition of the other 5000 Bars^s of the State Purchase, but from a conversation with
Mr. Coazey, we are apprehensive that the Slaves purchased by Mr. Dickinson & that purchased
by Col^o. Henry, is removing for Philad^a which, if so, will disable us from furnishing the
5000 Bars^s agreeable to the last Letter; and from your Letter of the 21st June to Mr. Coazey,
it seems to have been from Orders you have received independent of us, or from you
mistaking ours. What Col^o. Henry's Slaves lies much more convenient to Delaware
than this Bay, ought to go, but we can not apply of our Purchase, more than 5000
Bars^s for the Commiss^r including all that has been sent before and since our
Letter of the 11th of June, of the State Purchase, and we wish you to send us an Account
of as soon as may be. If any remains beyond that Quantity, we wish it to be sent to
Baltimore to Mr. W^m Smith with an Invoice.

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Sir. We have sent you by Mr. John Ward Coazey, the £12000. you wrote for. We have for some
Time past refused to let any Body go into New York, nor see any Propriety in changing
a Resolution which we rather wish was general in every State. We had ordered about
5000 Bars^s of the Slaves purchased by the State, to Philad^a the Best, by a Letter rec'd.
to Day from the Hon^{ble} Gov^r. Morris Esq^r. is to be sent to Balt^e to Mr. W^m Smith. We
wish you, Mr. J. W. Coazey, & Col^o. H. Hollingsworth would meet together & agree on the
most convenient to be sent to Philad^a to make up the 5000 Bars^s; the Rest of
your Purchase, we request you to forward to Mr. Smith with proper Invoices. The
Bran, Shorts & Ship Stuff we would have delivered to Col^o. Hollingsworth. Pray wind
up this Busines^s as soon as you possibly can and close & settle your Account, as we
may be able to render the Congress a General Account. Expedition is the more
necessary, as the State is like to be considerably in Advance, 'till the general Acc^t.
can be rendered.

William Smith Esq^r of Baltimore, we therefore request that you will forward all
the Slaves purchased under your Appointment now in your Hands with proper In-
voices to Baltimore, addressed to Mr. Smith and that you will finish this Busines^s
as quick as possible and make a final Settlement of your Accounts, that we
may be able to settle a General Account with the Congress, it is the more
necessary, as the State is like to be considerably in Advance 'till that is done.
