

In Council Annapolis 11th Sept. 1779

Sir

We received the Day before Yesterday a Letter from the Board of War dated the 27th of August 1779 in which they are much overburthened with Provisions at Philadelphia, by what we have heard of Col. Blaine they have there about 1000 that they are under the necessity of sending about five hundred to Fort Frederick and requesting of us a good Militia Guard and that the Provisions may be sent to this Day Week so that about the 28th Inst. they may be expected at Fort Frederick. We don't know what will be their Route but have recommended it through Black Gap, to shorten the Distance and avoid Frederick Town. Washington County has been so much burthened already we cannot expect a Guard can be fully furnished from thence, indeed it gives us real Concern to be obliged to call on the Militia any where for Service at this Season, but Necessity compels us we desire that you will immediately order a full Company of the Militia of your County of the Classes which have not yet served consisting of one Captain, two Lieutenants, one Ensign, four Sergeants, four Corporals and 60 Privates, to hold themselves in Readiness and actually to march so as to be at Fort Frederick the 27th Inst. where they are to continue on Duty with half the Number of Washington's Militia for five Weeks or until relieved, as we intend they shall be about that Time by a like Company from Montgomery, unless, as we hope, the Guard by that Time should either not be further wanted or some other Provision should take Place. You are to supply the Company with Arms and a reasonable Quantity of Ammunition. The Continental Commissaries are already ordered to furnish Provisions. In a Matter of this consequence where Delay might prove so very injurious, we can rely on your Efforts and flatter ourselves that the Militia, impressed with the Necessity and having a just Confidence that we on this as every other Occasion, shall joyfully embrace the first Opportunity of lightening their Burthen, will, as they have hitherto done, discharge their Duty with Alacrity. We request the Favor of you to send the inclosed to Col. Hughes immediately by Express, it is on the same Subject as this Letter & that you will also forward Mr. Murricks Letter by the same, or some other safe Hand, it is from Col. Blaine, appointing him Comdr. of Purchases with our Licence under the late Law.

Sir

The five nine Pounders were lent the Buckskin under the Orders of the Assembly; we did not know of their having been yet returned, as they are, we imagine, they are not wanted again and therefore presuming the Assembly would sell them, with any Number of, not exceeding two hundred and fifty nine pound Shot at Balt^o. for the Proportion of Price Guns & that sell for at Baltimore, of which make Enquiry and write us. This shewn to M^r. Keports or whoever has the Guns & that in Possession, is intended as a Warrant for the Delivery. We are so circumstanced that we cannot supply any Powder, it is all engaged to the Congress, or, immediately, any four Pounders, we have only what are on Board the Gallies & on the Posts, we have already refused to supply Powder and four Pounders, if we could spare either, we should prefer the first Applications.

In Council Annapolis 15th Sept. 1779

Sir

You are hereby empowered and directed to enlist into the Service of this State, for three Years or during the War, any Number not exceeding fourteen free and effective freemen, to serve as Soldiers according to the late Act of Assembly entitled "An Act relating to the Officers and Soldiers of this State in the American Army and other Purposes therein mentioned. As the Encouragement offered by the your Assembly is so liberal and the Number wanted is so small, we hope you may have in a short time your Choice of Men for this Service; by all Means prefer Country born, nor take any others, unless they have some Property or Connection which may attach them to the Place, before you pay the Bounty, which is two hundred and forty Dollars, to any Man, have him well examined to see that he is free, and that he is of the Age of 18 Years, let him, before a Magistrate sign his Enlistment, expressing that he is for three Years or during the War and also a Receipt for the Bounty. The Enlistment and Receipts, certified by the Magistrates before whom they are signed, shall be sent to you, you are to apply to Capt. Keports from Time to Time for the Bounty Money as it shall be paid.
